Have you made resolutions for the new year? If you are like over 50% of the US population, you probably have made at least one resolution in the last few days and furthermore, according to recent surveys, you probably resolved to do something very laudable like:

- Lose weight/get in shape/exercise more
- Eat healthier
- Save more money/reduce debt
- Watch less TV

If these apply to you - way to go! I hope you stick with your resolution beyond the 10-12 days that it takes for roughly 80% of "resolvers" to admit to breaking their new year resolutions. As valuable and worthwhile as these very common resolutions may be, though, what are we planning to do about our spiritual health in 2021?

Over the last year, as we have faced COVID19, the chaos of our recent elections, and the growing unrest that seems to be permeating every aspect of our culture, more and more of the conversations I have with people from all walks of life revolve around concern for our society and over the ever intensifying assault by the secular world on traditional Christian values and lifestyles. "The world has just gone crazy," is an expression I hear with increasing frequency, often combined with a note of despair and the related question: What can one person do to make a difference?

As we look hopefully toward a 2021 that will be "better" than 2020, let me suggest that the only way to make a real difference in this world is to do it one person at a time, relentlessly seeking to do a better job of living as a witness to the love of Christ in the way we interact with the people around us. And a great way to prepare for this resolution is to embrace those time tested and simple rules from our Methodist founder, John Wesley, who taught us to:

- 1. **Do no harm**. Be kind and gentle in the way we interact with those around us. Slow to anger. Quick to forgive. Stand strong in our faith but resist the urge to become offended by those who scoff at or belittle our Christian lifestyle and beliefs. Remember the advice of Paul when he taught that "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone."
- 2. **Do all the good you can.** Don't wait to be asked to help out with missions or church activities volunteer now to serve wherever there may be a need. Be generous with those who ask for help. Take time to listen when people ask for advice or comfort.

3. Stay in love with God.

- i. Commit to a plan for reading the Bible through during the next year. Engage in serious study of what we are reading.
- ii. Make prayer a central part of life. Resolve to pause for personal prayer at least twice every day. Become a part of a prayer group that meets on a regular basis.
- iii. Be a regular and enthusiastic worshipper. Commit to being in communal worship with fellow Christians <u>every</u> Sunday. When we worship, sing with joy, pray fervently, and invite the Holy Spirit to minister to us as we worship.
- iv. Participate in the sacraments joyfully and regularly. Give thanks for the gift of Holy Communion and pray for God's grace as we receive the bread and cup. Rejoice in the baptism of a new believer, commit to supporting them on their road to sanctification, and remember our own baptism and rejoice.

As we enter a new year of promise, opportunity, and yes, challenge, may we consider these simple rules as a starting point for learning how to be more diligent and faithful in following the example of Christ in our own lives. If everyone who claims to be a Christian would pray seriously for a better understanding of what it means to really follow Jesus and then go forth boldly to live as a true witness to the good news of Christ, what a difference that would make!

Let's make a difference in 2021.

WYNNTON NEIGHBORHOOD NETWORK

The year 2020 brought many changes to the entire world and of course many changes to Wynnton Neighborhood Network! We no longer require referrals. We permitted clients to come once per month instead of every thirty days, and we permitted clients to come more than the four times we used to allow. We also increased the amount of utility assistance we would provide per family. When we did our traditional Thanksgiving and Christmas food giveaways we continue to follow procedures and will do so for months to come. During this time, we served 3,602 families with 10,388 individuals including 4,354 children. We assisted 353 families with their utility bills, spending \$26,792.19.
